

## ATTENTION TO DETAIL


A muted colour palette with niches of detailed designs define the decor of this duplex apartment in Mumbai "The owner was accustomed to a certain kind of lifestyle, which included a spacious home. And this was where the challenge lay, in giving the owners the expanse and feel of a bungalow within the walls of a city apartment," says architect Mahesh Punjabi of Mahesh Punjabi Associates

To accomplish this, he designed the home in a neutral colour palette with pockets of

Spread across 3000 sq ft this duplex consists of a living, dining, study, three bedrooms and three terraces, all on the lower floor. Apart from public spaces on the lower floor, a guest bedroom is also located here. Two more bedrooms along with a private family entertainment space occupy the upper floor.

The apartment opens up to a lobby area that is clearly demarcated by an inlay of cream-toned tiles, which Punjabi further highlights by covering the exposed beams in wood, creating a contrast of materials and colours. 
